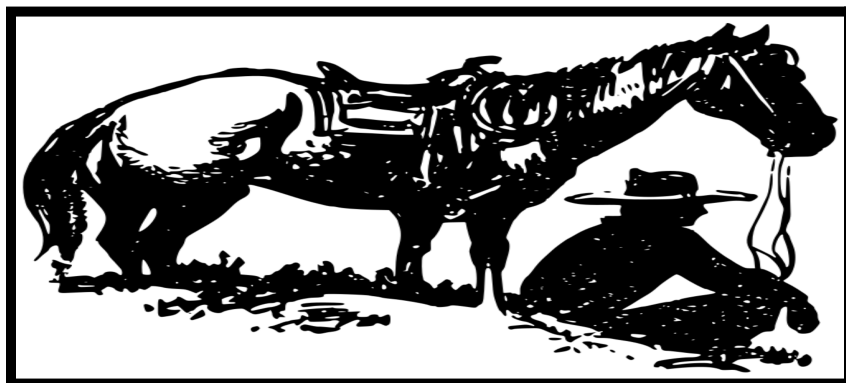
4. Dress up as your favorite building!

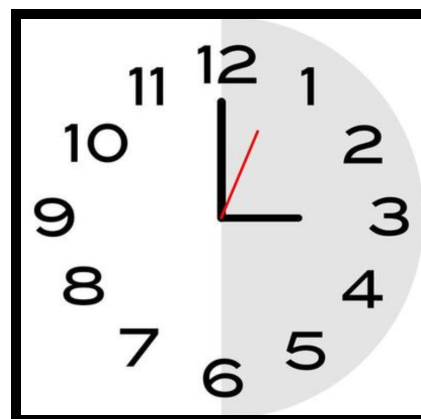

How To Read An Analog Clock

For our generations, it has proven difficult for certain people (you know who you are) to read the clocks which tell us when the boring 7th hour is over and the day has ended.

So in this article I shall try and write the best explanation of how an analog clock works, why you should be able to read it, and how to read it.



How to read it: The picture to the left shows the time 3:00. You may be peeing yourself on how that makes sense.

The longest hand, which is pointing towards the 12 currently is the minute hand. This hand moves faster than the hour hand (keep in mind).

The minute hand moves once every minute (some clocks it moves slightly every few seconds, very confusing) to signify the changing of the minute. When the minute hand moves from 12 to 1, for example, 5 minutes have passed.

The hour hand is what moves the slowest, the hour hand in the clock pictured is pointed at the three to signify what hour of the day it is. When the hour hand moves to the next number, 60 minutes have passed. This is the same as one whole revolution for the minute hand.

When school ends the time is 2:40 PM. So the hands on the clock would be pointing at the 2 and the 8. The minute hand pointing at the 8 because there are eight 5 minute intervals before 40. Whereas the 2 would be pointing at the 2 (how funny).

And I don't know how it works or who invented it, some European dude probably making things complicated for our fellow students some hundred years later or something.

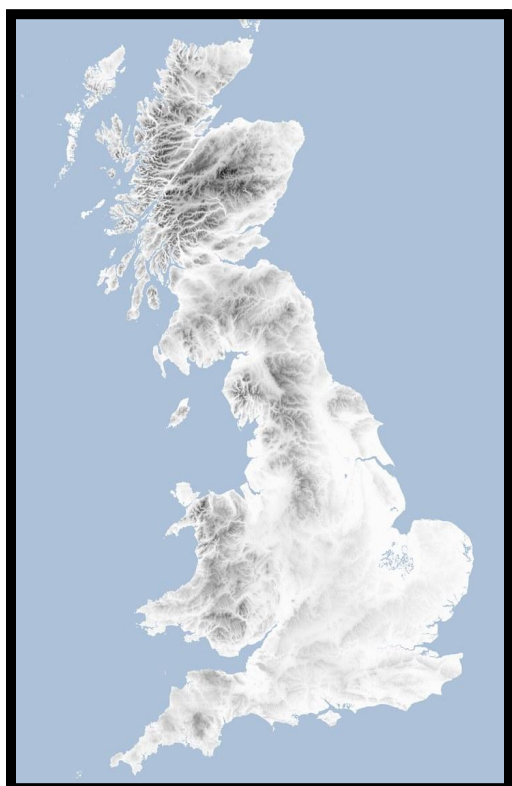
And if you still can't read it you are doomed.

What Are Fractals?

Introduction

What are fractals and what are their purposes? Well, the word Fractal is derived from the latin word Fractus, which means “fragmented” or “broken”, which fits with part of their description being that they are a fragment or part of their original shape or design. Fractals are a 4D concept introduced by Benoit B. Mandelbrot (pronounced mändəlbroot/ MAN-dəl-broht), the concept which was meant to challenge calculus’s idea that everything will eventually smoothen out given that you zoom in enough or look into it enough. Fractals, or more accurately, the hypothetical and rather imaginary fractal dimension in math—specifically geometry—is meant to demonstrate that a shape will not smoothen out just with zooming in or “looking closer” into the shape.

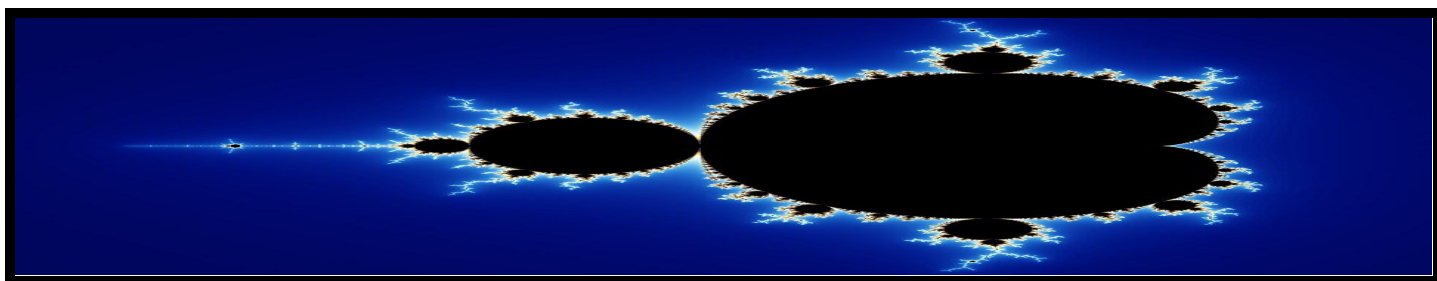


Great Britain

The prime example of this was using the coastline of Great Britain, as the theory proposed that no matter how much you zoom into it, it will still have some edges and sometimes even repeating sides or shapes all the way down to the atom. This theory creates things such as the Mandelbrot Fractal, named after Benoit himself, which is a representation of the theory and is one of the most popular fractal examples used, as when you zoom into the edges, it creates another smaller version of itself with its own smaller versions, essentially making it infinitely repeating, while also making beautiful and unique patterns within zooming in.

Other examples of Fractals

The shape of Great Britain’s coastline doesn’t entirely define what all fractals are like, as shapes like this are less often seen when using computer programs due to them being a chaotic fractal. This example was originally used to get an easier idea of what fractals are like due to them being a 4th dimensional idea. Additionally, there are plenty of other types of fractals with their own sets of “repeating” patterns, even if it doesn’t specifically make a repeat of itself immediately or in the same way. An easy way to see this example is within the things around you, especially in nature. One simple example, besides the coastline of Great Britain, is ocean waves, which can be calculated with how many waves there are, or rather, how active it is. The more waves created, or more active it is, the more dimensions there are, ranging from the numbers 2 to 3 with anything between them being accurate. Three in this case, represents a strong ocean current, while two represents a calmer ocean current.



The example of using ocean waves is a more accurate representation of natural/chaotic fractals that more closely follow the intended purpose of the theory, as it was proposed to go against calculus's idea that you can find the dimension of something with an equation. Fractals are not just known for their patterns and can be known for their looks; such as the Mandelbrot set or snowflake set, neither of which are chaotic fractals. They are also known to emerge as sounds or even the way an object repeats a pattern in a certain order, such as the pretzel set, specified by sound and can be displayed on a graph. And, if you're possibly using a mathematical system, you are able to color code it and find the unique factors through that as well.

Summary

Even with these given examples, again, no fractal is necessarily locked into a pattern, as there are "chaotic" fractals (that aren't exactly chaotic despite their names), though this does not defeat the theory, as the example of a chaotic fractal is Great Britain's coastline, which is why using the simple description of "a pattern that repeats itself" is not entirely a perfect description. Fractals are a 4th dimensional idea and have no exact definition or perfect look that can be understood, but this does not stop the fact its purpose is still unique and important to this day. Plus they're cool.

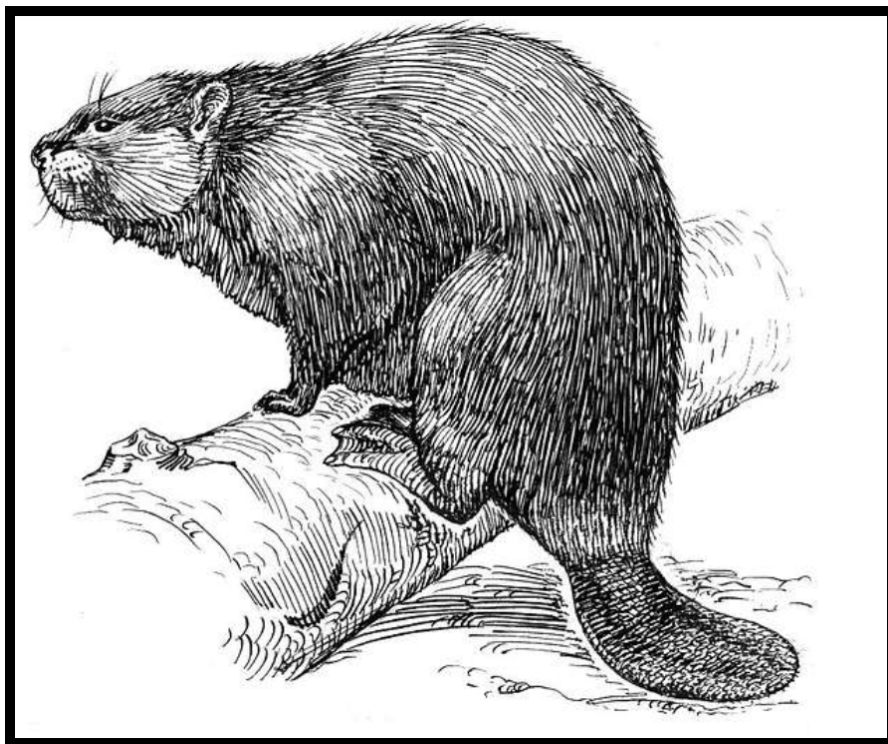
Pick Up Lines For Your Significant Other.

Step 9: Once you have the falling apart frame and the cushions made of glass you can put the two together and you get Misery!

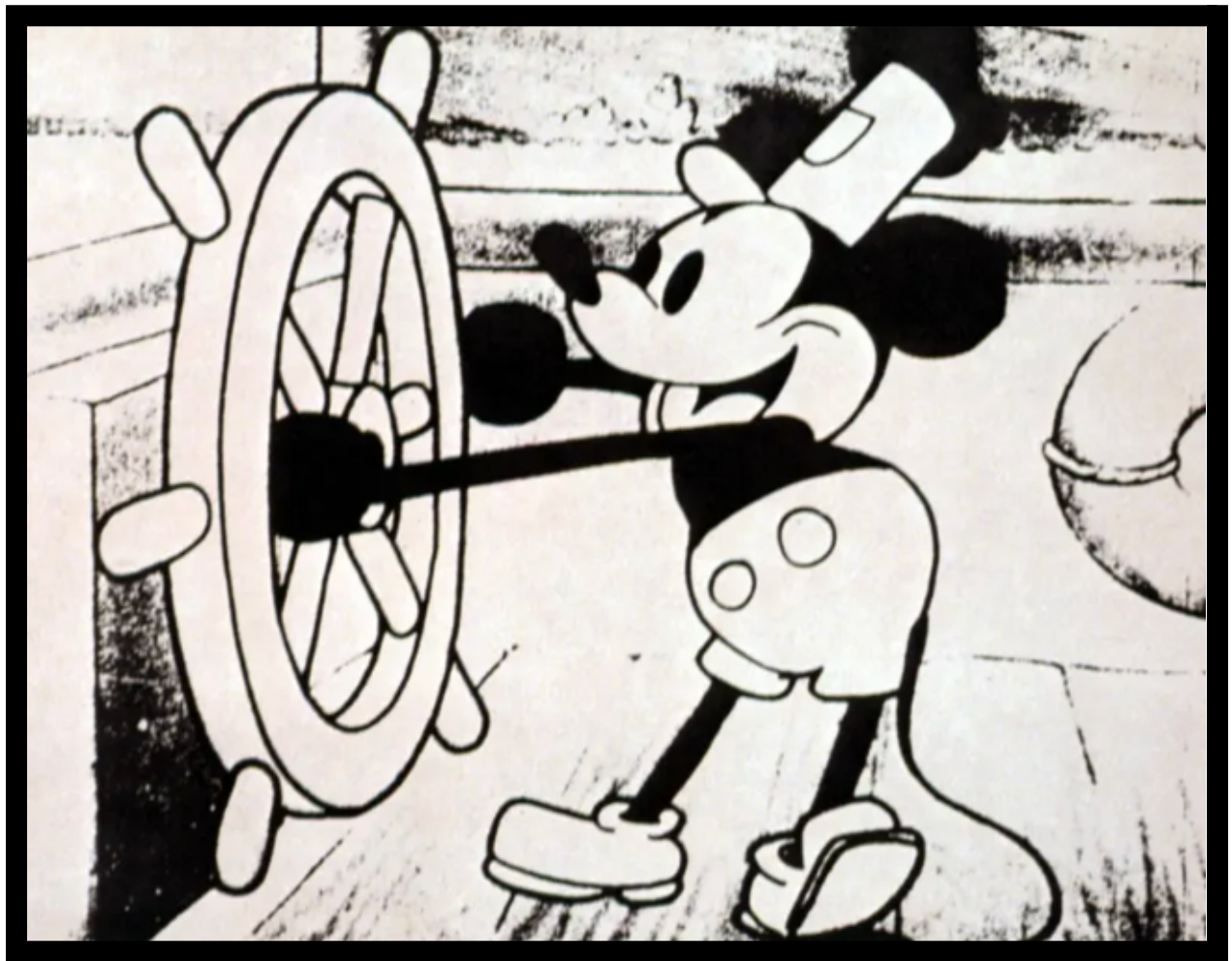
Step 10: Realise this was a bad idea and you should not use this for any means necessary.
